Commissioner's Column



"I would say the key element – of our Journey to Excellence is Program"

Another successful summer is just about over as our thoughts are beginning to turn to back to school and all the preparations associated with that event. Some are looking forward to it and others are dreading the thought. But whatever your thoughts are about school starting again, I hope you and your kids have thoughts and memories of a wonderful summer. Whether it was their first Cub Day Camp, their first long-term summer camp, their first High Adventure experience, or the continuation of those activities and others as second, third, fourth year or longer participants, I hope their memories will be with them for a life time.

Our local summer programs were hugely successful. Attendance at Forest Lawn Scout Reservation and Log Cabin was up significantly over 2010, our programs are improving and becoming more varied with opportunities for all age and skill levels; our camp staff's were consistently rated as outstanding; and our facilities and program areas are in a "continuous improvement" mode. Are you providing the Program that will accomplish this? We will work together to ensure every district and unit has the resources needed to provide your kids the kind of program they want and deserve as we move forward on our Journey to Excellence in the LAAC.

Another aspect of returning to school is our Fall Recruitment. I've talked many times that recruiting is a year-round effort, but our Fall focus can really set the tone for a good 2012. Are you ready? Think of the success we could have if each of your kids invited just one new friend to join them. And parents don't forget to do the same with your peers and other parents. How often have we heard that if we had more adult leaders we could reach more kids? Think about those individuals in your schools, religious groups, or civic clubs who may have an interest in helping Scouting if they were just asked. Reach out and invite them to participate in any way they can. You never know what or who you might find.

Scout Executive's Column



"Why's Everybody Always Pickin' On Me?"

Does anyone else remember the song "Charlie Brown" with the lament "Why's everybody always pickin' on me?"



This is my way of introducing a serious subject in today's Scouting, the physical fitness of our youth and leaders. Let me give you a perspective, in case you don't know me personally. I am overweight and out of shape. It's one of those gradual things that has just kind of crept up on me as I have gotten older. Suddenly I find myself about 40 pounds overweight, and puffing when I climb a steep hill at Log Cabin, elevation 8500 feet. This is not how I want to be, and I would want to change it even if everyone wasn't picking on me about it.

It first came home to me early this summer, when I got my physical for Philmont and a trip to The Summit, the BSA's new High Adventure Base in West Virginia. My doctor, who is probably a bit high on the weight chart herself, laughed at the BSA's specification of what I should weigh. She said it was ridiculous, that I could bench press a Volkswagen, and signed off on me doing anything I felt like doing. Well, the folks at The Summit didn't see it that way, although I did eventually get to enjoy a great white-water rafting trip. And I had to cut short a hike with my daughter in

the Philmont back-country. I was really relieved that her foot was bothering her, because I was short of breath and wasn't sure I could make it.

So, I am serious about getting this weight off, and building more stamina. I don't want to be limited in what I can do, and I don't want to set a bad example for the youth for whom I am responsible in Scouting. Now that I've 'fessed up, how about you? Will you meet the requirements and have the stamina to go on the COPE course at camp, or to be a leader for our next Jamboree, or to lead your pack on a hike in Eaton Canyon? Or will your Cubs, Scouts, or Venturers receive a less-exciting program because you just aren't quite up to the challenge? And be sure to get a good physical before you start. I found out that I have sleep apnea, and now that it's being treated, it is easier to find the energy to exercise, and getting a good night's sleep for the first time in years seems to be improving my metabolism.

I almost said "don't take this personally" but it IS personal. The fact is that your family and your Scouts need you. And as for me, I want to keep hiking, and rafting, and doing the good stuff, for a long time to come. So, if that's what it takes to get me there, keep picking on me! I'm taking the challenge...how about you?

JILLIAN INFUSINO AND 22ND WORLD SCOUT JAMBOREE

My name is Jillian Infusino and I had the absolute pleasure to travel to Sweden a few weeks ago for the 22nd World Scout Jamboree. I can honestly say that it was the best 12 days.

I traveled with 35 other youth participants from the Western Region, including two from Japan as members of the Far East Council and one from Texas who requested to be in the Western Region Crew. We had 4 amazing advisors who guided us through the entire Jamboree experience. I was the Vice President of Logistics for our Crew, Crew 70310. We met scouts from different parts of the world and we compared culture and scouting with them. We had dinner with scouts from England, Whales, the Czech Republic, Japan, Holland, Mexico, France, and Germany. Our group became extremely close with the German group camping two sites away from us—we absolutely LOVE them! We would spend the majority of our free time walking around and talking with them. As soon as we all got home, we all added our new friends on Facebook and we have talked almost every day since then. I will never forget all of the new friends I have made and I cannot wait to visit them someday in their home countries.

I also got a very special opportunity at the Jamboree, the BSA selected me and another Vice President from my crew, Michael Tharratt (Golden Empire Council, Northern California) to represent the entire USA and BSA in the Mock United Nations at the Jamboree. On August 3rd, Mikey and I woke up early to leave the Jamboree site for the UN Simulation. We were taken to a government building about 30 minutes from the Jamboree site. The topic of the day was Climate Change and then there were 8 subtopics regarding climate change and what we can do to help people be informed about climate change and do their part to prevent it from

getting worse. Mikey and I picked the Education caucus because we felt that we had some good ideas about what we can do to educate the world about climate change after the Jamboree. Our resolution passed with the 2nd highest vote count of the night! We also wrote an amendment to another resolution that was proposed and that amendment passed with the HIGHEST vote count of the night! Mikey and I were so proud of ourselves after this and we really enjoyed the entire Mock UN Experience.



The last few days were very fun, but also very sad because we started to say goodbye to our new friends. I cried the last 3 days of camp because I did not want to leave my new friends. I cannot express how much the Jamboree meant to me and I am so happy and thankful that I had the opportunity to go. I cannot wait to apply to work at National Jamboree in 2013 and apply to be an Associate Advisor for 2015 in Japan. I encourage anyone who wants to go to a Jamboree to go!

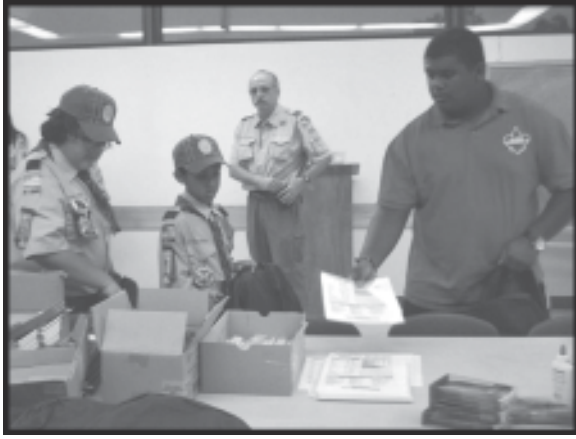

HONORING JOYSON SZU AT THE TOOTH OF TIME BY VIGNESH SADRAS

Nine Scouts and three leaders from Troop 693, chartered to the Parents of Troop 693, formed Crew 806-F and headed for Philmont Scout Ranch from August 4–20, 2011, with a special mission to fulfill a promise to Joyson Szu.

**‘One cannot stay on the summit forever -
One has to come down again.**

So why bother in the first place? Just this.

What is above knows what is below -

But what is below does not know what is above.’

Our former Scoutmaster and close friend of the Szu family, Mr. Glenn Nishibayashi (Mr. Nish to his Scouts), had promised Joyson that he would take him to Philmont when he recovered from leukemia, but it never happened as Joyson lost his battle to leukemia on March

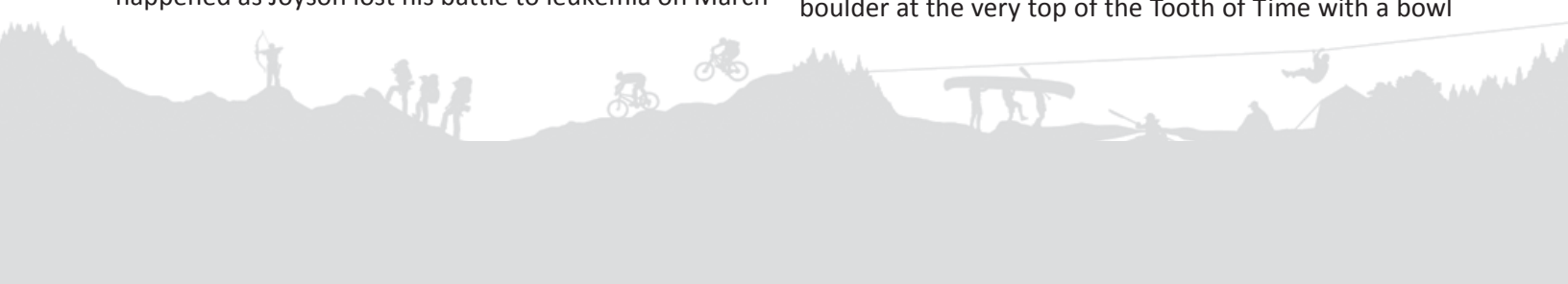
31, 2008. For this reason, Mr. Nish requested our crew to fulfill his promise to Joyson by taking his arrowhead and hospital bracelet to the Tooth of Time. Here’s the story of how we honored Joyson.

Once we arrived in Raton, New Mexico, we got on a bus that would take us to base camp. As we drove along the dusty road, I looked out the window to see a barren dessert landscape. The sky was filled with rainclouds, and lighting was scorching the land beneath it. In the midst of all this darkness, I was amazed to see a brilliant rainbow shining through the darkness. In that beautiful rainbow, I saw Joyson, smiling – unconcerned with the past, present, and future. The courage he must have had to smile through such suffering was reflected by the nature around me.

Each day on the trail at Philmont, a different Scout in our crew carried Joyson’s totems, so it was as if Joyson hiked the trail alongside every one of us. On the last day on the trail, our crew reached the base of the Tooth of Time. We encountered many crews coming down from the Tooth of Time, and they all gave us the same bad news – that we wouldn’t be able to summit the Tooth due to an intense thunderstorm at the top.

We were all very disappointed, and decided to do Joyson’s ceremony at the base of the Tooth before sending three or four boys to bury Joyson’s belongings as high as they could climb safely. To start off the ceremony, I spoke about Joyson’s brave and optimistic personality. Then, we all sang the Philmont hymn, and our crew’s historian played a song of his own composition on his harmonica. After that, I opened up the floor to anyone who wanted to say a few words. Since most of us did not get a chance to meet Joyson personally, I expected only a few people to speak. However, in the end, almost every single person in our crew spoke, and that too with passion. I was amazed. One of our advisors recited René Daumal’s “*Poem*”** in tears.

Following the ceremony, three other Scouts and I left to go up as far as we could when suddenly the clouds parted and the sun came out. Joyson was with us the whole time! Because of this divine event, we were all inspired to hike to the very top of the Tooth of Time on our hands and feet. After a half hour trek, we all made it to the top, and were astounded by the view. We found a huge boulder at the very top of the Tooth of Time with a bowl



that had been carved into it by the forces of nature. We decided that this was the perfect place for Joyson's belongings, and soon placed his arrowhead and identification bracelet inside it. We each placed one rock over the arrowhead and bracelet to cover the bowl, and as we laid each rock down, each person recited one of the twelve points of the Scout Law, since there were twelve members of our crew.

Just like that, Mr. Nish's promise to take Joyson to Philmont was fulfilled. That is the story of how our crew honored Joyson at the Tooth of Time – an unforgettable experience that will remain in our hearts forever!

A lifelong friend of my Jamboree Scoutmaster Jim Fretz, Grubby came to visit. With a smile and a twinkle in his eye Esten proceeded to hand out little googly-eyed bees to attach to our hats. It was a gift from our buddy at Trading post B.

Now back to 2010. The line is moving as slowly as the hot humid air at the Trading post. An elderly man in front of me turns and shares a Jamboree memory. He was in his late 70s, and his mother was in her 90s! In his southern drawl, (I think they were from Alabama) he shared his story. He pointed to a spot near the door and told me how he had been to several Jamborees and he liked coming to Trading post B because there was this "little old man" who would sit in a lawn chair and greet everyone with a smile and a twinkle in his eye.

He told me how this old guy would pass out little bees to everyone who came to visit the trading post, and everyone left as his friend. He said this guy was so

friendly and was always in his Scout uniform in the heat while talking to youth and adults with the same high spirits. I listened to my new friend's stories, and the line just didn't seem so long anymore. Now my heart was bursting with pride, that my buddy, our LAAC Scouting treasure had made such an impact across the Scouting miles and years.

Of course to those of you that knew Esten this is no surprise, his positive impact on others is legendary. Esten had passed on, prior to the 2010 Jamboree. I treasure the last Scouting visit I had with him at the W4N OA Conclave. We shared dinner and he told stories with the same smile and twinkle in his eye. He shared that BSA had just sent him his Scouting registration card noting that he had been registered in Scouting for 75 years!

I chose not to tell my new friend about Esten's passing. It would only have saddened the both of us, and I did not want him to stop sharing his wonderful stories about our mutual friend, Esten. I nodded and said, "Yea, I remember that little old man; he was awesome." So we chatted, while Esten's legacy of friendship lived amongst us at Trading post B that day.

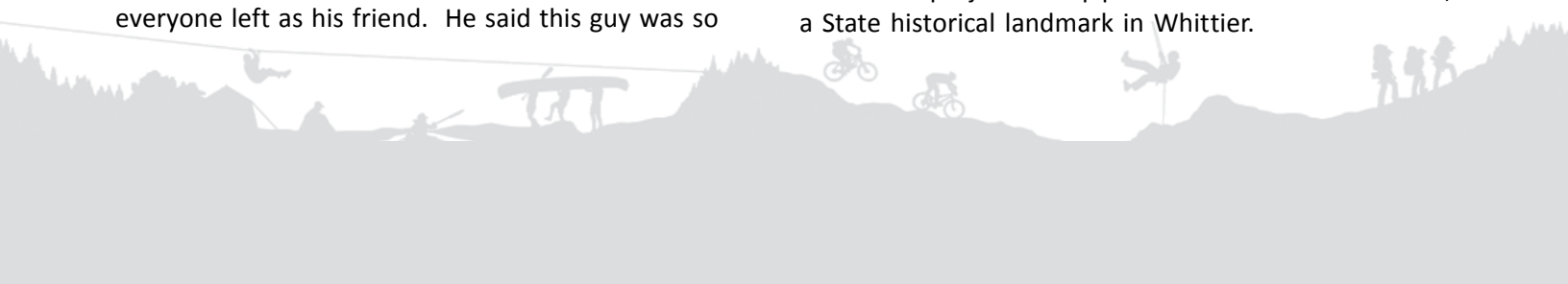

NICK ENTIN'S SAFETY IPHONE APP

Nick Entin, Eagle Scout, with Troop 128 chartered to St. Peter's by the Sea Presbyterian Church in Rancho Palos Verdes, recently published an iPhone app designed as an additional safety tool for outdoor enthusiasts to carry with them while enjoying the outdoors. The app was inspired by Nick's adherence to the Boy Scout motto "Be Prepared." Nick is an avid skier and came up with this idea while on the slopes of Mammoth Mountain.

The app allows those in need of assistance to send their GPS coordinates via e-mail or text message to preset contacts along with a message stating that they are in need of help. In addition, it features an audible alarm which can be used to guide rescue workers to their location.

Nick has been in Scouting since he turned in his application as a Tiger Cub Scout in 2001; he earned his Eagle Scout rank on October 27, 2010. Nick continues to honor his Eagle Scout charge to help others by developing a website for Troop 128.

While the app was designed to provide an additional safety measure and can be a useful tool for Scouts while they are on outdoor activities, it can be used in natural disasters, for example, helping to locate victims trapped under rubble from an earthquake.



Council News & Updates

2013 JAMBO SCOUTMASTER SEARCH IS ON

The Los Angeles Area Council is still looking for a few good volunteers to serve as adult scout leaders for the 2013 National Jamboree. Participants of the 2013 Jamboree will be part of Scout history in celebrating the opening of The Summit, the site of the permanent National Jamboree location on the Bechtel Family Scout Reservation in West Virginia.

The search for Jamboree Scout leaders is well on its way with interested adult Scouters encouraged to submit their application online at www.bsajamboree.org by October 15th. Volunteers applying to serve as Scoutmaster for one of four assigned troops being organized must have prior National Jamboree experience. Other positions available will include 1st, 2nd and 3rd Assistant Scoutmasters for each troop and up to two Crew Advisors. Interviews are scheduled to be completed before November with the organization of troops to follow in January.

Adult leaders will be offered a discounted rate off of the \$2,900 per scout fee. This includes travel, four-day tour, meals, lodging, Jamboree fees, patrol equipment, accident and sickness insurance and many special items (travel bags, two jamboree tee-shirts, jackets and more). Additional costs will include uniforms, vacation time needed, and material and supply costs when applying for a leader position. Leaders must be available for the dates of the Jamboree (July 15 – July 24, 2013) and the days before the Jamboree for touring (up to 5 days).

SCOUTMASTER AND ASSISTANT SM QUALIFICATIONS

- Must have a current BSA membership with a Boy Scout troop or Varsity Scout team.
- Scoutmasters and First Assistant Scoutmasters must be at least 21 years of age by the jamboree.

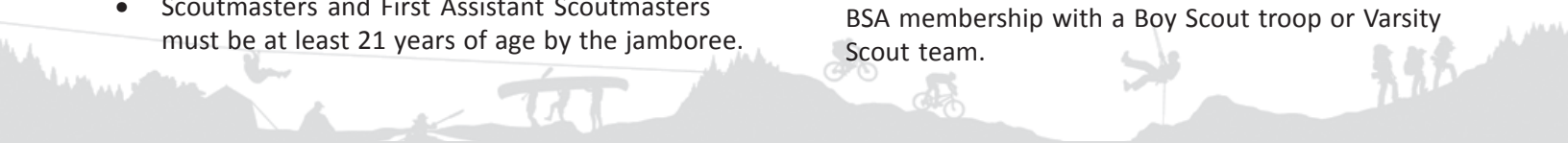
- Second Assistant Scoutmasters must be at least 18 years of age by the first day of the jamboree.
- Third Assistant Scoutmasters must be at least 18 years of age by the first day of the jamboree but not yet 21 years of age by the last day of the jamboree.
- Be currently serving as a Scoutmaster or Varsity Coach.
- For Second and Third Assistant Scoutmasters, be currently serving in any adult troop or team leadership position.
- Completed Scoutmaster or Varsity Coach Leader Specific Training.
- Completed Youth Protection Training within one year of the first day of the jamboree.
- Be able to serve as a role model of physical fitness.
- Have filed a Personal Health and Medical Record before the pre-jamboree training with the council jamboree committee.
- Be approved by the local council.
- Submit all registration fees per the local council's payment schedule

VENTURING ADVISOR QUALIFICATIONS

- Must have a current BSA membership with a Venturing crew.
- Be at least 21 years of age by the first day of the jamboree.
- Completed Venturing Leader Specific training.
- Completed Youth Protection Training within one year of the first day of the jamboree.
- Be actively serving as a crew Advisor or Associate Advisor.
- Be able to serve as a role model of physical fitness.
- Have filed a Personal Health and Medical Record before the pre-jamboree training with the council jamboree committee.
- Be approved by the local council.
- Submit all registration fees per the local council's payment schedule.

SCOUT PARTICIPANT QUALIFICATIONS

- Scouts and team members must have a current BSA membership with a Boy Scout troop or Varsity Scout team.



- Must have a current BSA membership with a Boy Scout troop or Varsity Scout team. Must be at least First Class Scouts.
- Must be at least 12 years of age by the first day of the jamboree or an 11 year old that has graduated the 6th grade, but has not reached their 18th birthday by the last day of the jamboree.
- Be approved by the unit leader and local council.
- Participate in a pre-jamboree training experience.
- Have filed a Jamboree Personal Health and Medical record with the council jamboree committee before the pre-jamboree training.
- Submit all registration fees per the local council's payment schedule.

VENTURING PARTICIPANT QUALIFICATIONS

- Crew members must have a current BSA membership with a Venturing crew.
- Must have graduated the 8th grade or be at least 14 years of age by the first day of the jamboree, but have not reached their 21st birthday by the last day of the jamboree.
- Participate in a pre-jamboree training experience.
- Be approved by the unit leader and local council.
- Have filed a Jamboree Personal Health and Medical record with the council jamboree committee before the pre-jamboree training.
- Submit all registration fees per the local council's payment schedule.

SCOUTING FOR FOOD

Scouting for Food is coming to your Neighborhood on October 29, 2011 – November 5, 2011. Scouting for Food presents Scouts an opportunity to participate in a Council-coordinated Good Turn by partnering with local community food banks in collecting food for distribution to those in need. Last year we, as a Council, worked over 7700 hours and collected 100,373 lbs of food. Here's how your unit can get involved:
